

## Remit regarding adoption of a National Uniform Policy

"That the Trust Board of CPNZ adopt a National Uniform Policy (Dress Code) for all Patrols and patrollers whilst on official Patrol Business. The time frame for this to be adopted is by 1 Jan 2019"

The following activities will have a suitable minimum uniform requirement taking into account CPNZ Health and Safety requirements:

1. On Patrol (Daytime Hours)
2. On Patrol (Nighttime Hours)
3. Representing CPNZ in Parades or on Public display
4. Representing CPNZ at Meetings with outside agencies
5. Any other event that has Patrollers in attendance

The following table is an example only:

Colour of Pants/ Skirts has not been described as this is for the TB to decide. It should also be noted that it is only a dress code, the Trust Board won't be supplying the extra uniform, then the pants and footwear don't all have to be the same. Tidy includes no holes, clean, and could include tidy shorts but not track pants.

Other tasks could include SAR searches, Fundraising BBQ's, Selling Raffles, Safer Plates, etc in which case appropriate clothing/ footwear for the task is to be worn.

It is noted that there should be a specification already for a "Uniform Hi Vis vest" (as per the strategic plan) all patrols should conform to this specification so there is uniformity of hi vis throughout the country. Long sleeve jacket or vest only needs to be worn if getting out of car in hours of Darkness and is to be available in patrol car at all times.

The use of uniforms by CPNZ is an effort in branding and developing a standard image but also has important effects on the partrollers required to wear the uniform. Asking partrollers to wear common uniforms in the colors associated with the CPNZ can go a long way in establishing an impression in the mind of the Public. Uniforms identify partrollers as individuals who are associated with CPNZ. Consistency in Partroller appearance can create a positive impression for the public and contribute to projecting a professional image.
