

Every day our hearts felt for the young female victims and their families. Grace Millane and Amber-Rose Rush should have been safe in New Zealand, but they were not. While I grant that there

is not much a community patrol could do to prevent someone's death, nevertheless, now more than ever New Zealand needs organisations like Community Patrols of New Zealand (CPNZ) that support the Police and proactively work towards keeping people safe in their communities.

Everyone will have recently seen the National Party release on their Law and Order discussion document. No matter which party you support, or align to, or which party (or parties) is in power, it is always worth having the conversation on what makes people safe or makes them feel safe in New Zealand. Times like this make me stop and ensure that I am up with the play with regard to what the government and the main parties are doing, what their policies are and how they are tracking with their planning and objective. I'm aware that a number of community patrols have undergone some local training this year with regard to gang awareness issues. With gang issues high on all parties agendas it is worth looking at the latest Police Association Magazine (www.policeassn.org.nz/newsroom/policenews/police-news-magazine) which gives a lot of information on gang activities and the issues of drugs and organised crime. In the magazine (available online and free) Police Minister Stuart Nash spoke on organised crime and gang issues at the recent Police Association annual conference. Detective Sergeant Ray Sunkel, head of the Police motorcycle gang unit talks about the recent influx of '501's from

Australia. Read what he has to say as the man with his ear to the ground and learn about what a '501' is. Superintendent lain Chapman, national manager criminal investigations talks about transnational organised crime groups and money laundering.

It seems to me that New Zealand has reached an all time high with gang related crime issues that affect all New Zealanders, so I attended the launch of the National Party discussion document, along with a number of other patrollers in order to show that we are out there doing what we can to prevent crime and make people feel safe. The opportunity arose to have the Leader of the National Party Simon Bridges along with MP Denise Lee and National's Justice Spokesperson Mark Mitchel meet with the patrollers and have an impromptu question and answer session. It certainly allowed us to 'fly' the CPNZ flag and show that we care about the future of New Zealand. Of significant interest, Simon Bridges is the Patron of the Tauranga South Community Patrol, Denise Lee is a patroller with the Onehunga Community Patrol and Mark Mitchell is currently going through the application process for his local patrol. It was really a bit of a friendly gathering of patrollers.



Lastly, I would like to say, with pride, thanks to all the patrollers who have spent the time making their communities safer and making people feel safe over the year. The Trust Board and staff of CPNZ have had a great year, we have grown and we are all looking forward to next year. Please have a very safe and very merry Xmas and holidays. Our brand new website is set to be launched on Monday 9th December!


Merry Christmas CPNZ!

The members section requires a log in which is unique to each Patrol Member



The CPNZ ID is the unique ID number printed on your CPNZ ID Card

The Password is your surname with a capital for the first letter eg Smith

Note, the ID number and the surname MUST match an individual who is marked as an active Patroller on the CPNZ National Database. If you can't get in, your Patrol Leader will need to follow up with National Office.

SOME TIPS AND TRICKS

IT'S A HAPPY TIME OF YEAR BUT IT IS ALSO THE TIME THAT SCAMMERS HIT.....

Only weeks ago National Office saw a very sophisticated scam come through our email account, this person had done enough research to learn the staff's names and come off as very convincing in their requests. Don't worry, we saw some suspicious signs so they didn't get anything :)

Please consider the below questions before giving out personal information or paying any money....this is especially important if you are handling confidential or sensitive information that you have gathered while on Patrol.

Is the call or email coming from a number or email account known to you? (double check this as sometimes the differences are VERY subtle eg office@cpnz.org.nz vs office@cpnz.com)

If you have your suspicions about whether they are from the company they say they are, hang up the phone, google the company's number and call them yourself.

Are they asking for personal details? RED FLAG!

If they are an official company that has an affiliation to you, they already have your details. Hang up the phone, google the company's number and call them yourself

If it is a charity asking for money? Google the organisation before making any decisions and donate through their secure portal, NEVER give your card details over the phone or an email to make a donation Is the call or email relating to something that you were expecting? eg if you didn't pay your affiliation fee you would expect CPNZ to call you to follow up however if you got a call from someone who is demanding that you pay a bill that you are sure you have never seen, this would be suspicious

Are they asking for money? RED FLAG!

Have you purchased something? Have they emailed/mailed you an official invoice?

If the answer to these questions is no then hang up the phone or delete the email. You can always Google the company and call them yourself to double check

Threats. Some scammers will not bother pretending to be someone they are not and will instead make threats if you do not do what they ask such as send them money. These threats are almost always full of hot air, stay calm, hang up the phone or delete the email and call the police
