A Word from our Chair.....

Hello all,

Already we find ourselves in the second month of the year and the organisation is off to a significant start.

In the last week of January the Trust Board and operations staff met for two days in Wellington with Police from the National Prevention Centre at Police Headquarters.

Of major interest for us is the progress being made with regard to the recognition of the Police Liaison Officer role and the Police as a whole recognising the significant work being done by these officers. It is a fact of life that Police Officers get pulled from daily work to assist on higher risk operations and on many occasions it is often the Community Policing Officer/PLO who is called upon for this work. I think it is very important for us as an organisation to understand this and work with our colleagues as they face the challenges of policing our society.

The year started with a bang when we first heard of the Novel Coronavirus (2019 nCoV). I find myself today, as I write this, wishing a safe and successful journey to the fantastic Air New Zealand pilots and crew who, at this moment are collecting many New Zealanders and bringing them safely back to our country. Having myself been evacuated from a high risk environment by air I know how eager those on the ground will be awaiting the 'Koru' emblazoned plane to arrive, and more importantly, take off again. The associated planning around the operation will have been extensive with emergency planning being undertaken at many levels including, Ministry of Health, Government Officials as well as Air New Zealand safety officers.

This current emergency follows close after the Whakaari/White Island event, and of course not far from our minds are the previous events, earthquakes, floods and weather events that now seem to be almost a day-to-day occurrence. Its very timely that we ask ourselves how ready and prepared we are to support our families and communities as responders to these events in support of Police and Civil Defence (NEMA).

A Word from our Chair Continued.

The Board is currently determining the training requirements for this year and we feel it must include the topic of emergency management. This will be decided on over the next three weeks. However I suggest that patrols consider their relationship and engagement levels with local Civil Defence. Many have a very close relationship while others have yet to engage. At the moment put it on your regular meeting agendas and watch out for more info on training from the office.

Operationally we have two important advances in our communications ability. Firstly the alias emails are now set up and being used by most Patrols. This is now the only way we communicate with Patrol leadership, it is professional and creates a more efficient future. Secondly, the website members-only logon ability enables us to keep sensitive matters online but make it available to everybody. Please note that this access is for all individuals of CPNZ. Please go in and make yourself aware of everything and keep up with changes and developing training and information.


I wish you all a happy 2020, from myself, the other Trustees and the National Office staff, thank you for all the work that you do and keep safe out there.

Safety First!!

We want to ensure that our volunteers feel safe and get home safely every time. Please familiarise yourself with section 7 of the training manual.

Please remember:

- Never engage in, or approach a conflict...observe from a safe distance and call the Police
- Put yourself and your Patrolling partner's safety first, if you are in danger...get out!
- If you are on foot (even for a few moments), Police Comms must be aware that you are engaging in a 3F and they must know your proximal location
- If you or your partner have a bad feeling about a situation, trust your instincts and get out of there
- You must always have a mobile phone with you so that you can call for help if you need it

If you are in a vehicle patrol:

- Doors are always locked
- Windows should be cracked so that you can hear and smell but not down enough for a hand to get through (especially in a crowded area)



As a reminder, all vetting results are sent to your Patrol's alias email, so please ensure this information is available to the correct person within your Patrol.

With the introduction of the member's tab which requires a login using your ID card number, please consider sending the ID card application at the same time as the vetting application. This will allow for a timely turn around for your new Patroller be able to access online training.

All new Patrol Members should be completing all 10 modules within their 3 month probationary period with the Patrol.

We now encourage all other Patrollers who have completed mandatory modules to complete modules 1 and 2 to finish off the 10 modules, by 30th June 2020. Access to the training modules is found by logging onto the members tab of the CPNZ website, however the username and password for the online training remain the same.

Waitemata Police Liaison Officer, Charlotte Jones had this to say:



Our brand new website was launched on Monday 9th December!

The Members section is an essential part of our new website and will house all:

- Forms
- Policies
- Resources
- Training
- Statistics
- Contact information for other Patrols

Interested persons can contact your Patrol directly by using the 'Become a Patroller' or 'Join Us' function

The members section requires a log in which is unique to each Patrol Member

The login form contains the following elements:

- CPNZ ID: A text input field.
- Password: A text input field with a toggle eye icon.
- Remember Me: A checkbox with the text "Remember Me (if you cannot log in, please contact your Patrol Leader or National Office)".
- Log In: A blue button.

The Password is your surname with a capital for the first letter eg Smith

Is your surname double barreled or with a hyphen? Push it together eg. Smith-Jones = Smithjones

The CPNZ ID is the unique ID number printed on your CPNZ ID Card

Have a zero at the beginning of your ID number? Leave it off eg. 001234 = 1234

Note, the ID number and the surname MUST match an individual who is marked as an active Patrol Member on the CPNZ National Database. If you can't get in, your Patrol Leader will need to follow up with National Office.



If your CPNZ ID card doesn't look like this, it is not an official ID Card! Follow up with your Patrol Leader immediately!
