Rowley CP Awarded by Community Board

In December 2020 a new Community Patrol in Christchurch, Rowley CP, won an award from the Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board for their long-term commitment to the wider community and its safety.

Early in 2020 a group of Rowley women became concerned at the level of disorder in their community. They called themselves the Rowley Mamaz and began to informally patrol their neighbourhood. But how could they grow their numbers, be more effective and keep themselves safe? Evelyn Kenneally, the Manager of the Rowley Resource Centre, approached CPNZ and found a Community Patrol already operated in their area. So their relationship began. Under the auspices of Christchurch South CP, the Rowley Patrollers were trained and equipped so that they could operate with some autonomy in their own area as well as taking part in the wider patrolling activities of Christchurch South.

Now known as Rowley Community Patrol, they have been instrumental in lowering the level of disorder in their own community and have added strength and diversity to the wider Christchurch South Patrol. Their award is richly deserved. Mahi Nui.

We'd like to thank everyone who came out for this event, from Patrol Leaders, Police, staff, guest speakers, Trust Board, volunteers, and everyone else who came along. We had a great time sharing, learning, and growing together as leaders. From mental health, to professionalism, to leadership itself, some of our guest speakers truly blew us away and gave us all plenty to think about.

The event was MC'd by Senior Constable **Bryan Ward**, a national advocate for men's health and a recipient of the Queen's Service Medal. In addition to Bryan, some of our guest speaker's work in the mental health sector is unparalleled in New Zealand. From **Gerard Vaughan**, whose mental wellbeing programme, Farmstrong, has aided rural communities nationwide. To **Lance Burdett**, an ex-Police crisis-negotiator, who entertained and educated our leaders on the strength it takes not only to lead others but also leads one's own mental health journey. Finally, **Michelle Kitney**, CEO of Volunteering New Zealand, gave an impassioned speech focusing on how to satisfy the mental and self-actualization needs of volunteers, an issue that resonated with us all.

Our partnership with Police was also on full display, with Police Commissioner **Andrew Coster** giving a speech via video message during the conference opening.

Superintendent **Eric Tibbot** was presented a talk about the importance of having partnerships with community organisations (like CPNZ) and how this can lead to more effective crime prevention in communities. Inspector **Brett Callander**, one of CPNZ's loudest supporters in the Police, gave a rousing speech on Police's partnership with CPNZ, the efforts both organisations are taking to strengthen this, and how we can work closely together to achieve our similar mission and vision.

Additionally, District Support Team Leader for Central, **Greg Canty**, gave a presentation on professionalism, CPNZ Trust Board Chairperson, **Chris Lawton**, gave two presentations on Patrol Leadership, and CPNZ Trustee, **Jim Searle**, had a presentation that highlighted the importance of risk management when patrolling.

National Prevention Team Joins Iwi and Communities Group

The team Community Patrols works alongside at Police National Headquarters, the National Prevention Team, has been strategically realigned as the Iwi and Communities group. To explain what these changes represent, Senior Sergeant Alasdair Macmillan has provided the following statement:

On 1 March this year, the Iwi and Communities group was established in Police National Head Quarters.

The group brings together elements of the former National Prevention Centre with Māori, Pacific and Ethnic Services, to ensure all New Zealanders can get the services they expect and deserve. Reporting to Deputy Commissioner Wally Huamaha, the group is led by newly appointed Assistant Commissioner, Chris de Wattignar.

The redesign provides opportunities to work more closely with Iwi, Pacific, and ethnically diverse communities to tackle the drivers of demand in harm prevention – such as youth, family harm, alcohol and mental health, among others. Bringing innovative programmes, such as Te Pae Oranga and the Integrated Safety Response, under the same group will help us continue to develop partnerships with the communities and leaders we rely on, and enable more innovative solutions to be developed to prevent harm and crime.

This now sees Superintendent Eric Tibbott, who previously led the National Prevention Centre, become Director - Community Partnerships & Prevention. He will be leading the workgroup with accountability for the drivers of demand, implementing strategies relating to these, and leveraging the opportunities and relationships established in the Iwi & Communities group to best reach out to vulnerable people and communities.

Eric, as the Director Community Partnerships & Prevention will have a key role in developing prevention opportunities, by deepening Police's community engagement.
